


But it's clear from the start that someone in the group doesn't intend to share the treasure, should it be found.




Option Two: The Westing Game by Ellen Raskin

Option One: <u>The Giver</u> by Lois Lowry




Winner of a John Newbery Medal




Option One: <u>The Outsiders</u> by S. E. Hinton

The Outsiders is a coming-of-age novel by S.E. Hinton, first published in 1967 by Viking Press. Hinton was only 15 when she started writing the novel; however, she did most of the work when she was 16 and a junior in high school. Hinton was 18 when the book was published.


The publisher — believing that the book would have more credibility if people assumed that a male had written it — advised her to use her initials, S. E.

Option Two: <u>1984</u> by George Orwell




Option Two: 1984 by George Orwell



4. Ninth Grade Options

Option One: The Other Wes Moore: One Name, Two Fates by Wes Moore

The Other Wes Moore: One Name, Two Fates tells the story of two Black men with the same name: Wes Moore. Both men grew up enduring similar hardships, but Moore, the author and narrator, was encouraged to overcome these difficulties and became successful, while Wes, his counterpart, found himself sentenced to life in prison for murder. Moore learns about Wes and, fascinated, writes him a letter, hoping to find out more about what led Wes to a life of incarceration. Moore receives a response from Wes and begins to visit him in prison, where the two share their stories.

Option Two: Blink by Malcolm Gladwell

Blink is a book about how we think without thinking, about choices that seem to be made in an instant-in the blink of an eye-that actually aren't as simple as they seem.

Why are some people brilliant decision makers, while others are consistently inept? Why do some people follow their instincts and win, while others end up stumbling into error? How do our brains really work-in the office, in the classroom, in the kitchen, and at the mall? And why are the best decisions often those that are impossible to explain to others?
